A Brief History of the Notts. Tennis Tournament

The first Notts Tennis Tournament was held at Trent Bridge in 1887. Apart from the interruption of two World Wars, it has been held annually ever since.

For the first twelve years of its existence it continued to take place at Trent Bridge or on the adjoining Notts Castle C.C. ground. Then in 1899 it moved to its present home in The Park in the centre of the City of Nottingham.

In 1887 each of the Singles titles was won by a member of the redoubtable Snook family and there have been other notable local winners since. There was C. P. Dixon, considered by many to have been the finest English Doubles player of all time, twice a Singles finalist at Wimbledon, twice Doubles champion there (with H. Roper Barrett) and a member of the team which beat Australasia to regain the Davis Cup for the British Isles in 1912. The current President of Notts L.T.A., Eric Attewell, won in 1932; in 1956 it was the turn of Davis Cup player Tony Pickard, now Notts' representative on the Council of the L.T.A.

Among the ladies, the ageless Miss Middleton won the last pre-war event in 1939, and followed this by winning the first post-war one in 1946. Then there was Miss Freda James, later Mrs Hammersley, surely the finest Notts woman player ever, twice Wimbledon Doubles Champion (with Kay Stammers) and a regular member of the Wightman Cup Team of her day.

But over the years the Tournament has always attracted more than just a local interest. Winners have included A. W. Gore, three times Wimbledon Champion, H. L. Doherty who won the Wimbledon title for five successive years and, in the more international atmosphere of post-war years, a host of Davis Cup players, including most recently Stan Smith of the United States and the Chilean Jaime Fillol.

Between the wars, the most notable name among the ladies is of course that of Mrs Lambert Chambers, who was the title holder here in two of the four years during which she was Ladies' Singles Champion at Wimbledon – 1910 and 1911. Post-war winners include Mrs Pat Todd of the United States; Miss Judy Tegart (now Mrs Dalton) in 1968, the year she was runner-up at Wimbledon; and, the following year, Mrs Janes, still better known to us as Christine Truman. In 1963, the last year before sponsorship, Miss Darlene Hard of the United States beat Brazil's Miss Maria Bueno before a packed Saturday crowd to take the Nottingham title.

The next year, 1964, The L.T.A. authorised sponsorship of tournaments, and Notts began an association with the Mansfield Brewery Co which has only now ended. Then in 1966 John Player & Sons added their support, both financial and otherwise such as, for instance, the production of this programme. With 1968 and the advent of truly "open" tennis, the involvement of Player's increased until this year, with the agreement of Mansfield Brewery (who now support Notts tennis in other ways) Player's took over the entire sponsorship of the Tournament under its new name.

It was in 1970 that the Notts Tournament staged, virtually for the first time in this country, a Round Robin event with four invited men competing for a first prize of £1,000. The success of this innovation caused it to be repeated, this time with ladies, in 1971 and the popularity of the event in spite of the worst Tournament weather for many years led to this year's development – a Round Robin for both men and ladies. With the Championship events running alongside, this will provide tennis of that high standard which the growing number of spectators has come to expect.

There are many others to whom thanks are due – the Civic patrons and those listed elsewhere in this programme who provide financial help; the willing voluntary helpers; the citizens of Nottingham who feed and accommodate the players in their homes; not least, of course, the competitors themselves, from many parts of the world, old friends and new, whom it is a pleasure to meet and watch for a brief week in each year.



Mrs. L. W. King (U.S.A.) Billie-Jean Moffitt was not yet 18 when

she startled the tennis world in 1961 by beating the number 1 Wimbledon seed Margaret Smith (as she then was) in her first match. In 1965 she married Larry King and it was under the now familiar name of Billie-Jean King that she won the Ladies' Singles title at Wimbledon in successive years, 1966, 1967 and 1968. It was in 1967 that she won all three titles at Wimbledon and in the United States and South African Championships. She has at various times also won innumerable other Singles and Doubles Championships all over the world. In 1971 she won the British Covered Court Championship for the second successive year, the Australian and United States Championships and two Wimbledon titles - the Ladies' Doubles Championship for the seventh time (and the fourth time with Rosemary Casals) and the Mixed Doubles with Owen Davidson (for the second time).



Miss E. F. Goolagong (Australia)

Evonne Goolagong is an all-round athlete, having represented her school at athletics, swimming and basket-ball as well as tennis. She first toured in 1969, won the Plate at Wimbledon in 1970 and in 1971, at her second attempt, won the Ladies' Singles title which she still holds. This was just seven years after she had won her first important event, the New South Wales Under-13 Hard Court title - she is still not quite 20 years of age. Her gay and unstrained approach to her game have helped her to win in two years the title her coach Vic Edwards predicted for her in four, but she has had mixed results since, going down to Virginia Wade in the final of her native Australian championships in 1972. An Australian Federation Cup player, she was born of part-Aboriginal descent on 31st July 1951. She is the current (1972) South African Champion, beating Virginia Wade in the final.




Miss S. V. Wade (G.B.)

Virginia Wade made her Wightman Cup debut in 1965 and has played regularly since. She has reached the later rounds of many tournaments around the world. She was winner of the British Hard Court Championship in 1967 and 1968, the United States Open Championship in 1968 (beating Rosemary Casals and Billie-Jean King on the way), the Dewar Cup in 1969 and the Italian title in 1971. In 1972 she has beaten Evonne Goolagong to take the Australian Ladies' Singles title and she was runner-up to Evonne Goolagong in the South African Championships. A Kent County player, she was born at Bournemouth on 10th July 1945.



Miss R. Casals (U.S.A.) Rosemary Casals first made her mark on

Rosemary Casals first made her mark on International tennis in 1966, when she reached the last 16 in the Wimbledon Ladies' Singles and the quarter-finals of the Ladies' Doubles with Billie-Jean King. She won the Doubles title with Mrs. King the following year and also in 1968, 1970 and 1971 – they are the current holders. She won the Mixed Doubles at Wimbledon with the Romanian star Ilie Nastase in 1970, in which year she also won the Ladies' Doubles (with Mrs. King) in the South African and Italian Championships. She has played for the United States in Wightman Cup and Federation Cup matches. She was born in San Francisco on 16th September 1948.



M. Anderson (Australia) Mal Anderson became a professional in

Mal Anderson became a professional in January 1959 and won the London Professional Championships that year, including Ken Rosewall among his victims. Although he never again won the title, he reached the quarter-final round in both 1963 and 1966. He first played for the Australian Davis Cup team in 1954 and in 1958 was a member of the team that lost the Challenge Round to the United States. He has not entered the Wimbledon Championships for the past two years. Born in Theodore, Queensland on 3rd March 1935, he is married to Roy Emerson's sister Daphne.



C. E. Graebner (U.S.A.)

Clark Graebner won the Wimbledon Junior Invitation event in 1961 and made his Davis Cup debut for the United States four years later, against Spain. He has always figured prominently in the later rounds of Tournaments around the world: losing semi-finalist to Emerson in the South African Championships of 1966; runner-up to Newcombe for the United States title in 1967; a semi-finalist at Wimbledon in 1968, and a quarter-finalist there in 1969, 1970 and 1971, when he went down 12/10 in the final set to Britain's Roger Taylor. He was born at Cleveland, Ohio, on 4th November 1943.



L. A. Hoad (Australia) Lew Hoad won the Australian, French

Lew Hoad won the Australian, French and Wimbledon titles in 1956, losing in the American final to his great partner, Ken Rosewall – with whom he has won so many Doubles titles and shared in great Davis Cup victories. After winning Wimbledon again in 1957, Hoad turned professional and was barred for many years from the amateur game. By the time the new initiative in 1968 enabled him to enter Wimbledon again, he was no longer regularly playing competitive tennis and he has failed to survive to the later rounds. He has chalked up many professional victories. He has set up a tennis ranch in Spain and is coach to the Spanish Davis Cup team. He was born in Sydney on 23rd November 1934.



A. Metreveli (USSR) Alex Metreveli is the leading Russian

Alex Metreveli is the leading Russian player and has been a regular member of their Davis Cup team since 1963. He has an outstanding singles record, particularly in 1967 and in 1970, when he was undefeated in the European Zone. He has reached the later rounds of many important tournaments in both singles and doubles, although he has not yet won one of the major championships. He was born in Georgia, USSR, on 2nd November 1944.
